HOLY CHOW!

Holy Chow will start serving in September and will need your help. To get the system up and running, and to work out the kinks, the steering committee will do all the September work. After that, the ministry will require very small commitments from very many people.

COOKING: – According to Where You Sit – Casseroles will be collected once a month. The pans and the recipes will be distributed one week and collected two weeks later. The work will be done according to where people typically sit at Sunday Mass. Those who usually sit at any Sunday Mass in Section 1 will be asked to supply the October casseroles. Those who usually sit in Section 2 will provide for November, etc. As we will start off needing only 20 casseroles per month, the requests will be modest – like 6 casseroles each from the 4:45 and the 9:30, and 4 each from the 8:00 and the 11:30. When Sunday 6:00 is back in gear, they will get their request.

DRIVERS AND SERVERS – Each time the truck goes out, it will need a driver and a few servers. For insurance reasons, the number of drivers must be small and carefully chosen. The 2-5 servers will go in their own cars.

"SECTION SHEPHERDS" – Each section will need one person to hand out the empty pans and collect the full ones. (Pan Handlers?) They will need to do this only three times every two years. Later, these "Section Shepherds" will be asked to provide minor help in other areas.



CALLING ALL GROCERY BAGS

We need lots of grocery bags – lots and lots. Please put them in the bins in the Memorial Hallway. If you have accumulated a few too many grocery bags, please bring them. We need all sorts – reusable, plastic, and paper – for two projects:

Holy Chow – When people come to the food truck, we will give them to-go meals, Panera bread (we just learned that Panera in Somerset will be giving us their day-olds every Monday night), beverages, and a few other items. Any sort of bag will help with this one.

Saint Vincent de Paul Food Pantry – They need the reusable sort. It is much easier for the folks who come to Saint Vincent to carry one bigger bag than several small ones.

From the very beginning our volunteers not only assisted other parishes in providing shelter for the homeless, but we also were able to host families in the basement of our former church building in East Millstone. More recently we have been able to host them at our building in Millstone Borough .Now, we need your assistance more than ever! Please see the information below regarding how you can be involved.

WE will begin assisting Hillsborough Reformed Church, August 14 – 21, 2022.

How Does HOME Work?

HOME ~ Housing Outreach Multifaceted Empowerment formerly IHN is a proven and effective way for religious communities to offer shelter, meals, and assistance to homeless families. The program uses existing community resources: churches and synagogues for overnight lodging, congregations for volunteers, social service agencies for screening and referrals and existing facilities for day programs. Each Network Congregation furnishes overnight lodging and meals for up to four families on a periodic basis. Our parish hosts here at the Parish Center and we also support the hosting and meals at Hillsborough Reformed Church several other weeks during the year.

Guests in HOME stay for one week at a time, at a rotating area congregation. During the day, if not employed, they are at the Day Center to do laundry, shower, seek employment, permanent housing, and interview with Social Service Agencies that can further assist them. The Day Shelter is open seven days a week.

Due to Covid, families who are a part of HOME, have been staying at a local hotel. HOME, with the support of the congregations, will be rebooting the hosting sites. We are in need of YOUR assistance as we are presently seeking to embark on this venture. To begin again, can be a daunting task, however, with our stellar reputation of parish service history, we are confident to be holy, happy hosts to the guests. **WE will begin assisting Hillsborough Reformed Church, August 14 – 21, 2022.** Saint Joseph Church is responsible for meals, hosting, and overnight coverage on August **15**th, **18**th and **20**th. We can also offer additional support on the other days, and these are a few ways you can volunteer:

- Set up and breakdown crew
- Meal Preparation/ Serving Meals: Dinner should arrive and set up by 5:30
- Evening Hosts: 5:15pm 9pm
- Overnight Shift Coverage: Mon. Fri. 9pm 6am /Sat Sun 9pm to 8am
- Linen Pick-up prior to hosting week

All volunteers must be Virtus Trained and fingerprinted. This can be easily accomplished here at Saint Joseph Church.

Volunteers will stay in Memorial Hall, the white building right next to the Church on Millstone River Road (1 Amwell Road).

Make some noise for justice

Civil rights activist and Presidential Medal of Freedom recipient Congressman John Lewis hoped young Americans might get in trouble. "Good trouble, necessary trouble," he specified. Lewis wished that a passion for what's right might compel our young citizens to "find a way to get in the way" of injustice. A young prophet named Jeremiah once got in the way, winding up at the bottom of a well and nearly starving to death for causing trouble for his king. Jesus promises the same sort of trouble in our families if some members are baptized with fire while others don't feel the burn. Find yourself some good trouble.

TWENTIETH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME TODAY'S READINGS: Jeremiah 38:4-6, 8-10; Hebrews 12:1-4; Luke 12:49-53 (120). "He will die of famine on the spot, for there is no more food in the city."

Monday, Aug 15, 2022

Grief requited

Given that Mary, the mother of Jesus, was likely in her teens when she gave birth, she was probably only in her late 40s when Jesus died 33 years later. Life expectancy was a lot shorter then, but potentially Mary could have been alive for many years after seeing her son for the last time. One ancient historian wrote that she died 11 years later. It must have been a time of intense longing for her. Whether she died before she was bodily assumed into heaven or was assumed before she died is left open-ended by the church. Either way, it was an extraordinary reunion with the Lord befitting her status. Consider your own reunion with God. Plan ahead!

Tuesday, Aug 16, 2022

Embrace the mystery of communion

Brother Roger Schütz, founder of the Taizé movement, died on this date in 2005. Brother Roger began Taizé in 1940 in the French countryside, envisioning a humble monastic community to respond to the needs of war-torn refugees—but also to welcome followers from all Christian denominations. The simple house he purchased eventually blossomed into a global place of pilgrimage, especially for young people. Taizé is especially known for beautiful chants still used in congregations all over the world. "The Church is a mystery of communion," Brother Roger wrote, where we "can discover an aurora of reconciliation and the practicing of a simple joy." Pray with Taizé through their website.

TODAY'S READINGS: Ezekiel 28:1-10; Matthew 19:23-30 (420). "For God all things are possible."

Wednesday, Aug 17, 2022

To each is given a mission

On this day in 1887, Marcus Garvey, one of the most influential black activists of his generation, was born in Jamaica. Founder of Universal Negro Improvement Association, a fraternal organization that he grew into an international powerhouse after emigrating to the United States, he is credited with coining the term "Black is beautiful" to encourage racial pride. Though controversial in many of his views, he is remembered for his advocacy for racial equality and economic justice. Be a voice for equality and justice as you live out your unique Christian mission.

TODAY'S READINGS: Ezekiel 34:1-11; Matthew 20:1-16 (421). "You have made them equal to us."

Thursday, Aug 18, 2022

Be willing to look closely

On this day in 1998 the renowned Holocaust scholar Harry James Cargas died. Most of his teaching and writing focused on the Christian response to the Holocaust. What haunted him, he once said, was that "probably every Jew killed in the Holocaust was murdered by a baptized Christian." Cargas could have chosen an easier academic path, but instead he forced Christians to take stock of their complicity. Today's Psalm is a good help for examining our own cooperation with contemporary sin: "A clean heart create for me, O God."

TODAY'S READINGS: Ezekiel 36:23-28; Matthew 22:1-14 (422). "Many are invited, but few are chosen."

Friday, Aug 19, 2022

Keep it simple

Saint John Eudes, a 17th-century priest and mystic, worked tirelessly to spread the gospel message, which he feared was being corrupted by various heresies. For Saint John, Christianity wasn't complicated: "The Christian life is a continuation and completion of the life of Christ in us. We should be so many Christs here on Earth, continuing His life and His works, laboring and suffering in a holy and divine manner in the spirit of Jesus." And just what was Christ's work? Look no further than the two great commandments he gave us: "Love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind," and "Love your neighbor as yourself."

TODAY'S READINGS: Ezekiel 37:1-14; Matthew 22:34-40 (423). "The whole law and the prophets depend on these two commandments."

Saturday, Aug 20, 2022

Schism-saver

In 1130, Pope Honorius II was dying. In anticipation of his death, a group of cardinals agreed on Cardinal Gregory Papareschi as the next pope. Upon Honorius' death, Papareschi was elected Pope Innocent II. But another group of cardinals had another cardinal in mind for the position, Cardinal Pietro Pierleoni, and elected him as Pope Anacletus II. The church then had a pope and an antipope. Question was, which was which? Saint Bernard of Clairvaux threw his considerable weight and hard work behind Pope Innocent, who eventually prevailed, preventing what easily could have spiraled into a schism. Remember this lesson from Bernard: "If you are to do the work of a prophet, what you need is not a sceptre but a hoe."

TODAY'S READINGS: Ezekiel 43:1-7a; Matthew 23:1-12 (424). "The greatest among you must be your servant."
